Words to 2014 Graduates

Who am I to tell the 2014 graduates how to enter their future? I have occupied this life for ninety years and have had many occupations and experiences; therefore I have been deemed wise enough to write a statement of direction to you graduates.

In the world I came from, an often repeated medical need was repairing arms broken by the crank while cranking the car engine to start it; also, people

ran outside to search the skies if they heard the sound of an "aero plane." When a car's side-curtains were replaced by roll-up glass windows people proclaimed, "They've gone about as far as they can go." It seems like just yesterday when I had to drop a nickel into a pay phone to call home, but most homes did not have a phone to answer my call. A call to Kansas City from Oregon cost about \$4.00. Also, I've lived through peaceful and war times.

All of this change has been like living in five different worlds. The rapid change in worlds is accelerating, until life in tomorrow's world exceeds my experiences. How can I rationally propose how today's graduates should live in a world I never knew? I will suggest some principles you may live by in any world. These principles have proven successful in all world situations.

Now that you are free of supervision from the schools, don't become a wandering generality. This will happen unless you choose some career objective to seek. Choose a goal you feel is worth working towards. You may later find you want to change to a different goal, but this is better than having no objective to work towards. You will have gained experience in working towards an objective rather than being pushed into whatever position others would impose upon you; and you will have more experience in working in the world. Many will say, "that diploma is just a piece of paper that has little meaning," nevertheless, it is an important key to open doors of opportunity for you.

Every trade or business has its own language. If you do not know the vocabulary, you cannot read well enough to study the directions and speak with those who you are doing business with. Immediately learn the language of your business. For instance, the medical field speaks a language others do not know, as does the legal, the insurance, the investment, and engineering. They each have their own language. Learn this first. The individuals with the least education pay the most for education because they spend more time in the unemployment lines, they receive the lowest pay when employed, and they are the first to be discharged when business is bad. Your present diploma does not mean your education ends.

- 1. Decide which is most important to you: fame & riches in mortal life or pursuing eternal life in God's kingdom. You can live a kingdom life while continuing life in the world, but it must be by a definite choice.
- 2. Take responsibility for your own acts.
- 3. The fear (respect) of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge. Proverbs 1:7
- 4. In all thy ways acknowledge him and he shall direct thy paths. Proverbs 3:6---This has proven very true in my experiences.
- 5. Wisdom is the principal thing; therefore get wisdom; yea, and with all thy getting get understanding. Proverbs 4:7 Think things through seriously and go the wise way; don't waste time and effort just following the crowd and doing something only because "everyone is doing it."
- 6. Make a serious, lifetime commitment to the Lord and He will direct your life. However, think it through very seriously because you may later want to forget your commitment. God does not forget. In fulfilling such a commitment throughout your life you will be presented with many decisions. One decision may offer riches, fortune, and pleasure; the other leads to fulfilling your commitment, perhaps at considerable sacrifice. Choose the one that is right for moving you toward the goal or commitment you determined.
- 7. Look at God's commandments not as orders you must follow, but as instructions on how to get to God's wonderful kingdom. Follow each one as a step upward.
- 8. All scripture offers directions to live by and to prosper, especially the book of Proverbs. Learn and apply these.
- 9. Remember that whenever a people followed God's word, the nation became wealthy and were protected. It is that powerful.
- 10. Do these things and you will look back in time and clearly see that the Lord has directed your life.

Roofing

Between May 22 and May 27, several of the men of the congregation were blessed to assemble in fellowship and labor together as they replaced the roof of Michelle Coburn's home. The aging roof had started to fail, leaking water into the garage and showing signs of considerable distress. Brothers Ron Trammell and Brian Herren

measured the roof lines and contours last Fall and began planning for its replacement. Brother Jim Clark took the rough sketches to Dalwig Brothers in Brooks, Oregon, where they calculated the necessary materials and developed an itemized list of goods. Michelle visited Dalwig Brothers to select her preferred color of roofing and arrange for payment of the previously itemized list of sup-



plies. The management at Dalwig is to be commended, and hereby honored, for the discount they offered on the materials once they discovered the nature of our labors and how the Church body was coming together to help in the community. Their kindness and support should be remembered. On Thursday, May 22, the Saints worked at tearing off the old roof to expose the wood that needed to be evaluated for integrity. Replacement of the underlying faulty wood was overseen with wisdom by Brother Willis Johnson, who directed Brothers Brian Herren, Jim Clark, and Gary Livingston with the saw. Brothers Travis Clark, Robert Ellison and Michael Livingston stripped away the decaying shingles and brittle tar paper before removing or pounding down nails. Their efforts cleared the way before us. After thorough repair of the underlying wood, new fifteen pound tar paper was laid on Friday, after Brothers Ron Trammell, Charles Murnieks and Kevin Herren joined the aforementioned. On Saturday, the men spent nearly 15 hours working on the project, but no work was performed on Sunday in order to observe the Lord's day. After two more days of partial work, Monday and Tuesday, the repairs were complete and a beautiful new roof was in place with a thirty year guarantee. Sisters Michelle Coburn and Donna Johnson took excellent care of their brothers, providing cold drinks and well appointed meals. The Ladies Relief Society of the Salem Restoration Branch also contributed thoughtfully. Brother Ron Trammell served as the foreman of the project, overseeing each aspect, and his hard work was impressive throughout. Brother Willis' knowledge and experience was also a lift to the work and honorable. The rest of us gave what we had, if not skilled experience, the very energy of our souls, strength of our backs, and thrust of our arms. We began our labors with prayers for safety, thanksgiving for the favorable weather, and appreciation for the fellowship. As we worked, we discussed scripture, remembered old testimonies, and considered the future. Our Sister Michelle now has a new roof, but such labors always build much more than can be discerned with observation. May God be glorified in our efforts and the building up of His kingdom.
