Communion Wine

On August 21, 2017, our family took possession of a new home after the Lord had opened the doors before us and revealed His loving hand by many obvious blessings. The move has yielded many wonderful consequences and shows promise for years to come. However, our moving had one unavoidable consequence that was not as pleasant: we had to leave four hand-nurtured grape vines that had provided communion wine for the three branches of the Pacific Northwest. One of the first

projects of our undertaking at the

new property would have to be the replanting of our vineyard. We watched the sun and water patterns, developed the soil, raised a portion of the garden, tilled the earth, and started to build the arbor for the new grape vines before the first winter. In researching the best grape for communion wine (grape juice), we decided upon a variety cultivated at Cornell University in New York, a variety called NY 47616. The grapes had been prized for their dense clusters of dark blue, sweet, very flavorful, early ripening grapes. The variety had an attractive, compact growth pattern that was resistant to pests and diseases. In New York, the vines had proven weather hardy to minus ten degrees Fahrenheit, and the fruit had won a number of taste tests as a seedless table grape. It was also promoted for it's delicious juice. In pursuing the vine starts, we soon learned that shipping grape vines across state lines was somewhat complicated by agricultural laws and regulations. There was not a way to ship the vines into Oregon. Efforts to ship to Washington and Idaho also fell through. Continued on page 2



After that, the 3 boats got together and did a simultaneous 3 boat 360 degree spin that was amazing! The rest of the trip back was full of high speed spins, water spraying and great fun.

Arriving back to the dock, some of us wetter than others, we thanked our pilot and talked about all the fun the day had provided.


Surely the Lord made the way for those with a desire to travel. He blessed us along the
