It has been a very dramatic and eventful year for this region in the Lord's vineyard, as well as the

United States and the world. In March 2020 the country closed its doors to one and all as restrictions became heavy to avoid spreading the epidemic of COVID19.

In September 2020, wild fires blew out of control by unusually high winds that caused one of the most destructive seasons on record in Oregon. One million acres burned, over 3,000 buildings destroyed, and 40,000 people were evacuated from their homes. The fires affected the entire state by emitting heavy smoke that changed the lighting and made breathing unbearable.

Then in February 2021, the worst ice storm Oregon has seen in 40 years lasting 3 days, caused 350,000 residents to lose power. It was the worst disaster Portland General Electric has ever seen, and many remained without power for weeks on end. Broken trees and limbs can still be seen all around even today. All the while, fear gripped the hearts of many as the pandemic continued to spread, keeping closures and restrictions in place in society at large.

To top it all off, on June 26-27, 2021 Portland, Salem and Eugene saw the hottest temperatures experienced in over 120 years, with Salem reaching 117°! What exciting times!

There are many reasons that cause the hearts of men to fail, yet God does not leave His own, and we can appreciate the tremendous opportunity and gift to witness prophecies coming true from the beginning of time, first hand in our day! Even through our tribulations, sufferings of physical afflictions, and trials of the heart, our hope never fades in Christ Jesus. Whatever becomes of us in this life, we will always rejoice in His glorious name.
