With the exception of Brother Darling, those Saints from other parts of the country are attending at their own expense. It is an honor and privilege to receive our brothers and sisters in fellowship, and a witness of the growing unity within Christ's fold that they have a desire to travel such lengths to be here. Those joining us from more distant places are being provided tents, motor homes, etc. so that they can stay on the reunion grounds full time. In the hope of informing every interested party, the reunion schedule is provided here. It is also available online, along with all regional registration forms and event schedules, at restoredchurchofchrist.com. Every effort was made in the Spirit, when scheduling, to honor the ministry called and authorized of God within the local branches. The services were organized to provide for those elements fundamental to our collective worship, as identified in the scriptures: preaching, teaching, prayer, fasting, and the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. Opinions are sure to be several, some suggesting the length of one item to be too long, while others suggest the length of the same item to be too short. As much as it lay within us, let us put on the bonds of charity, permitting the surrender of self will for the acceptance of God's grace, trusting our days to the Lord and redeeming each hour with care. Let us unite as one body and forsake that which divides. The Saints are encouraged, as much as it is possible, to stay on the reunion grounds and minimize transit between reunion and those worldly influences unavoidable upon departure. We might also consider other ways to minimize the intrusion of worldly influences, such as refraining from the use of cell phones, televisions, and unedifying music, etc. Those given more wholly to communion in the Holy Spirit will find the opportunity one of rich promise and reward. A few suggestions that have been made by priesthood members may also help organize our thoughts and prepare our hearts to worship in simplicity, giving way to the Spirit, and bringing forth sacrifices acceptable to the Lord. Not discounting the promptings of the Holy Spirit or suggesting any action aversive to His guidance, the following might prove beneficial:

- During prayer services, we might be considerate of others, not making our prayers unnecessarily long or repetitious. To be free of offense, wisdom will direct our course, leaving behind the portions which weary the Lord and offend our brother.
- When sharing testimonies, we might take care to avoid self-promotion, preaching, teaching, or storytelling. Our testimonies are most fruitful when they bring honor and glory to God in the highest. They needn't be complicated or eloquent, but the whole flock is blessed when God is magnified. There will be time set apart for teaching and preaching, which time is delivered to those commended of the Spirit to the same.
- ◆ Let us do our very best to attend each service, standing promptly, giving our all, extending every effort in hospitality, and humbling ourselves in spirit. May the Lord be pleased in our most earnest efforts. I can hardly wait to see each of you there!

Patriarch Vernon Darling

I was born in North Dakota, in 1934. Until I was 8 years old my family lived on my grandfather's homestead. We moved to Independence, Missouri in 1942. I don't remember going to church in North Dakota, but my grandmother taught me about Zion and I knew that Independence was where Zion was going to be. I graduated from high school in Independence and then went to Graceland college for two years (It was a two year school then). I was married the summer of 1954 and joined the army a few months after that. During my time in the military, my first two boys were born in France. I worked in construction for two years, then I went to work at Armco Steel and served a five year apprenticeship in electronic repair. I worked for Armco until I retired in 1991. Since my retirement, I have

continued to work in construction projects as project manager for two churches and two houses. I have also built cabinets and other wood working projects. I have stopped doing these things because of my age. My first wife and I were married for forty years and she passed away in March of 1995. We had four children together. While they were growing up we used to sing together as a family in the various churches where I was asked to provide ministry. This way we brought ministry as a family wherever we went. After my wife passed away I found I was terribly lonely. I asked the Lord if I could meet someone to be my wife because I found I needed a helpmate. He brought Margie into my life and she has been there for me and with me for the past eighteen years. This time in my life has gone so quickly. I am completely amazed. Together we have six children, sixteen grandchildren, and nine great grandchildren. My spiritual life really began with my grandmothers teaching me from the children's magazine, Zion's Hope and her reading bible stories to me. I was a boy scout, (Eagle) and in the 4-H as a youth. I was ordained a deacon when I was 17. While my family and I were in France we had the communion only once. I found out just how much I missed my church family and corporate worship during that time. When we came home, I threw myself into my duties as a deacon and I discovered just how rewarding that can be. I was ordained a priest in 1960, which was an office I cherished. I was ordained an elder in 1968, and a high priest 1980. During those years I was engaged in administrative duties as pastor or counselor. I was called to be a Patriarch-Evangelist in 1987. This is a totally different kind of ministry and I feel as if I am still learning. In many ways it has been most rewarding and fulfilling. I have traveled from Maine to Vancouver, Texas to Florida and many other states. It has been my privilege to go to Israel, Honduras, and three times to Australia, where I provided ministry.

High Priest Paul Gage

Paul Gage was born December 27, 1940 in Porum, Oklahoma. He spent most of his life in and around the area of Tulsa, Oklahoma. He graduated from Graceland College in 1965 and later received his Master's degree in Educational Administration from Northeastern State University in Talequah, Oklahoma. He was married for over 40 years to his wife Sharon. Never was there a better example of a loving husband which was made even more evident during the last 6 months of Sharon's life when in September of 2010, she lost her 6 month battle with cancer. He was with her from the moment she got sick until she drew her last breath. He was also father to

2 sons, Ronald and Stuart who both serve in the office of priest, in the Restoration.

Paul served as an elementary teacher and principal for 28 years before retiring and gathering to the "Centerplace" in 1993. He then served as an administrator at Center Place Restoration School for nearly 9 years. He was first ordained to the office of deacon in 1959 and has also served as a priest, elder and currently as a high priest. He has been a pastor, youth leader, camp and reunion director and has held various different roles in the Conference of Restoration Elders. He spent a month with Sharon, bringing ministry to the saints of Australia in 2007 and has stayed very busy working with the Coordinating Council of Elders and the Publication Committee.

lumbia, and was accepted to medical school at Washington University in St. Louis where he obtained his MD. He joined the navy to help pay for his medical school, and served as a Navy Doctor in Adak, Alaska, and Barstow, California. He married Judi Gaucher, of Maysville, Missouri. They have four children, Brett, Lauren, Natalie, and Brian, and one grand-daughter, Sydney. Doug and Judi and their family have participated in many missionary endeavors across the globe. Sister Cessaries led us in Song each morning before breakfast. It is such a lovely experience to hear the ladies singing their praises to God in beautiful harmony.

After a big breakfast, the Puyallup ladies shared the worship they prepared, which set the Spirit high for our first session. Sister Suzy led us in a class she titled "Seven ways we might become better laborers with God by the year's end." She had asked a few women to talk about this form a certain perspective, such as a teen, marriage, laboring as a family, after the children are grown, We were to offer suggestions and ask for discussion on it. We all came home with many ideas of how we can individually, as a family, as a church member and as a citizen, labor together with God. Sister Judy McMillan asked for me to be sure and include the idea of coming together weekly as a family (even when the children are grown and you have grandkids) to share a meal, visit and have bible study. This could be any study that would bond the family closer in God's truths and love.

Elder Brian gave an excellent power point class using the theme. I asked Sister Chris Ornelia (my sister) to share something that was very meaningful to her during the retreat. She shared how much she loved the many good scripture references so that she could look back on them and that she took note on some good "food for thought". Examples: "God is not our equal, He is OUR EXAMPLE!". Romans 12 1-5 and Ephesians 4 2:23-28. "If God is a God of works that never end, and men are created in His image, then men will find fulfillment in righteous work." "Men must exercise there own faculties, anxiously engaging themselves in the work if they are to be wise servants. D/C 58 6c-d Remember if we labor for good, we will never labor alone. We labor alongside each other, the Lord, the Angels..... Rev. 19:10 I am thy fellow servant and of thy brethren that have the testimony of Jesus.

Another good thought Brian shared was that many of us think "I would work with God gladly if He would only tell me exactly what it is that I must do". Perhaps He may have already told us! Like when a parent asks their child to clean their room. They go to clean it, but see a toy they haven't played with for a while and start playing. After a while they forgot why they were sent to their room. Or when a child asks the parent if they can go outside and play. The parent may answer yes, but after you get yourself ready. The child leaves, then runs back and asks what they need to do, "get dressed, brush your teeth, put your shoes on....." After each step they run back and ask "can I go outside now"? Many times children need one step at a time or they forget what they were asked to do. Are we no different with our Heavenly Father?

We ask for a specific need and we don't see it answered how we expect. He is answering our request, but he might be saying "First you must do step one (go through this trial), then step two (grow in faith) and as part of the answer. We must remember that His way is always best.

Lunch was served before we knew it! Once filled with good food again, we gathered to be filled with worship by singing our praises to God. Following our singing was our next class, taught by Elder Mike Terry. Sister Kay Campbell shared some of the scriptures that were meaningful to her: D&C 128: 8 b-c, 1 Cor 3:9, Dut. 6:5 Thou shall love the Lord... John 15 11-17 love one another. Matt 5:16-18 don't hide your light.... Matt 7 25-33 Ye shall know them by their fruits..... D&C 94:2 e-g ...much precious fruit. Mosiah 1 48-49 learn wisdom, when you're in the service of your fellow being, you are in the service of your God. She also enjoyed hearing the many attributes we need to serve the Lord, such as: discipline, faith, loving, compassionate, submissive, that we are to do all things with love. We can show love by sending Birthday cards and get well cards. Another thought Mike presented was this question: How can we Spring Clean our lives?

Sisters Dianna Clark and Sharon Trammell taught us a new craft. We were able to choose from many glass items to "etch" using decals of different kinds to decorate the glass object. Sister Chris etched a nice casserole dish to take to potlucks both at her work and at church. Sisters Rachel and Shari Mason each etched a beautiful flower vase that they filled with yellow flowers when they got to their homes.

The sisters from Vancouver shared their worship after dinner including song, testimony, poems, prayer and thoughts. Sister Chris read a couple songs, one of which is a favorite by Brandon Heath "Give me your eyes". I love this song

A Beloved Brother Passes to His Reward

Arnold Rhoads, a faithful servant of the Lord, passed to His reward on January 20, 2014. He was blessed to have celebrated his 100th birthday with family and friends on December 7, 2013. Brother Rhoads was a father, grandfather, World war II Captain in the European theater, carpenter, and guiding light for all who knew him. He was protected by God during World war II, as reflected in the following testimonies: At the start of World War II, Arnold was told by his pastor, "You will be away from the Church for awhile, but you will return". He had a deep sense of peace. One of several incidents where the hand of God protected Arnold occurred during his initial physical. In line, going from station to station,

he saw trouble ahead: "color-blind vision assessment". He knew color blind soldiers were never made officers. Just as it was his turn for the assessment, one of the medical staff started playing a practical joke on his assistant, and after the laughter, Arnold, heart racing, was waved right on through. He was protected yet again as the US forces prepared for D-Day. He was transferred into a different battalion who were to operate artillery. A particular part for the guns was on back order, so his training and deployment were delayed. D-Day began without him. Of his original company who stormed the beaches in France, there were no survivors. Time and again, God's hand rested over him and spared him. Ultimately, Brother Arnold returned to the US safely, where he served many years as the presiding elder near Yakima, Washington. The reasons why Arnold was spared became obvious in the fruit of his labor, until such a time as God permitted his return home this year. He will not be forgotten. ...concluded on page 7.

Arnold Ervin Rhoads "graduated" to be with his Lord on January 20, 2014 in the quiet peace of his home at the Ponderosa. He was born in Seattle one hundred years ago on December 5, 1913 to Ellen and Josiah Rhoads. After graduating from Lincoln High in 1931 he began to work delivering ice to help his mother support the family during the Great Depression. In 1941 Arnold was drafted, but allowed two months before enlistment to finish his first home and marry the love of his life, Earlita Emslie. During the war he was a supply officer, a captain, providing supplies during the Normandy invasion and on into Germany. After the war Arnold and Earlita raised their children, two daughters and two sons. He often told people "they never had an argument." They moved from Seattle to Moses Lake in 1954 and he worked as a carpenter building homes, offices, hospitals, dams, bridges, and missile silos during the Cold War. As they neared retirement, they began to build a rental business which he maintained until 2008 when he left Moses Lake to live closer to family in Yakima. They were featured in the Moses Lake Herald as "the Rhoads of Love."

Arnold was a spiritual man. He served as a priest and an elder in the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints in Seattle and served as pastor and pillar of the congregation in Moses Lake for many years. He was dedicated to the Lord and served Him, keeping his covenant all his days. He had many spiritual experiences; his most recent assured him the Lord had prepared a special place for him in His Eternal Rest.

Arnold enjoyed his garden and often was found tinkering in his garage trying to fix anything that had a useful purpose. He also played the accordion in his youth, and later entertained family on the piano and organ playing "old time favorites" and hymns.

Arnold was preceded in death by his wife of 64 years, Earlita Emslie Rhoads, and his parents, two sisters, Nettie Olds, and Viola Weeks, one brother, Russel Rhoads; and one grandson, Jose Mateo Esquivel. Surviving and left to honor him are two daughters, Janet Esquivel (Zillah, WA) and Marilee McCrath (Kansas City, MO), and two sons, Bill Rhoads (Sibley, MO) and David Rhoads (Chinook, WA); ten grandchildren and seventeen great-grandchildren. Now he has been greeted by the loving arms of his wife and mother, and is at rest in the glory of the Lord. He will be missed.

Regional Missionary Fund

A Valuable Work in the World

At the 2013 Fall Conference, a motion was passed to create a Northwest Regional Missionary Fund to assist in spreading the Gospel and promoting God's work beyond the Pacific Northwest. The fund is kept separate from the regional general fund, and is only supplied by those offerings specifically marked for this



particular end. A missionary board comprised of one representative from each organized branch serves to oversee the distributions. Any person can write to the board and request funding for any particular missionary effort, but only those efforts receiving a 2/3 affirmative vote from the board will be financed. Those serving on the missionary board at present are Elder Wray Moreland of Vancouver, Elder Gary Jones of Puyallup, and Priest Jim Clark of Salem.

Recently, the board reviewed and approved two petitions for missionary funding. The petitions were as follows:

- 1) Copies of the Compendium of the Scriptures to be sent with the next available missionaries to East Africa, not to exceed \$250 in purchase or 90 pounds in shipping weight. To be distributed to the native priesthood.
- 2) \$200 to be dedicated to assist in the second printing of the Book of Mormon in Nepalese.

The regional missionary fund provides an opportunity for the Saints of the Northwest to pool their financial resources and assist the work of the Lord around the world. There may be some who would like to help in Africa, Nepal, the Philippines, Honduras, Australia, etc. but do not have the ability to travel or the specific contacts necessary to ensure that their contribution is used in an effective, productive way. This new fund provides an instrument to ensure that our collective efforts are used wisely, in the right place, and through the most advantageous means. There is proper oversight, with each branch participating, and it gives us one more way to unite our works as a people preparing to be one in Zion. It is important to respect individual branch sovereignty, but we are also blessed as we do more things together, as one body, of one heart, and one mind.

If you would like to contribute to the regional missionary fund, please be sure that the memo line of your check clearly indicates your intent, and send your check to Brother Jim Clark, Regional Treasurer at 4577 Sunflower Way NE, Salem, OR, 97305.

Note: The aforementioned expenditures are the only use of the regional missionary fund to date.

ready to be harvested. If the weeds were separated before the wheat was allowed to fully grow, the wheat could be damaged. One way that Kevin explained this to us is that he had planted wheat and tares in a plastic bucket to symbolize God's crop, in other words, us. Before either of the plants were fully grown it is really hard to separate the wheat from the tares without the possibility of damaging the good wheat. This goes for us too, and God loves us so much that he waits until we have fully grown before separating those of the world and those that chose the Lord because He doesn't

want to damage us. God also used parables such as the wheat and tares to help people fully understand what He is trying to say. He wanted people to read his words in a way that would be understanding to anyone and everyone. He made parables by relating them to the real world, and everyday life to help us understand and wheat farming was one of them.

We also had evening chats with Brian about how removing our sins is better than focusing on helping others remove their sins, and how it can be a really hard task to help others in need while we are still shadowed by sin. We learned that sins can help slow us down with our overall performance of life, which can be a really hard thing to overcome. God can help, but it can also be friends, family, or even someone you just met. We did a little activity where each of us had blindfolds and ear plugs. The blindfolds and ear plugs represented our sins and how they can blind us and block our hearing of God and goodness. Each of us put on our blindfolds and one of the leaders took us to a different part of the sanctuary. We then had to put in our earplugs and walk around (slowly) until we found somebody and we removed their blindfold, and ear plugs which symbolized us helping remove their sins. This took quite a bit of time, and it also wasn't very easy to walk around blind, which is basically what happens when we don't ask forgiveness of our sins. We did this one more time, except we were told to remove our own blindfolds and ear plugs first the second time. This happened to be A LOT easier, and less time consuming, and without the sins holding us back it would be easier to help others that are still blind. Travis taught about the power of the tongue, and how it can be used to build people up, but it can also be used to tear them down. He also taught us about why we need to bridal our tongues even in the hardest of times, and also about how powerful someone's words can be. One of the points he made was about joking around with people, and how you might say something in a joking matter but it can still hurt a little inside. You don't ever want to use your tongue to tear people down. Everything you say or do should be to build the kingdom of God. During his class he even pulled a reel cow tongue from a cooler to help us remember the point. After the class, Brian thought it would be fun to eat the cow tongue, so he and Kevin cooked it up and served it to us for a snack!

I learned so much during that weekend and it was great to see everyone and be surrounded by such good people!


