## Steadfast in Christ, A People Growing

Dear Brothers and Sisters, we are blessed to live in the time in which we do. The sterling impress of the gospel banner remains untarnished by the caustic creeds and dark works of men. In principle, the gospel work seems ever more noble in the face of the advancing depravity about us. Over the course of the past year, we have grown as a people. The subjects of our conversations have changed. Our attendance at every worthy fellowship and worship has grown. Our focus on Christ's virtues rather than our own has become more notable. We have shed the idea that we cannot be perfect while upon the earth for a commitment to labor every single day until we are. Our eyes have become more singular in the consideration of God's glory, looking forth with sobriety and joy for the day of Christ's return. The preparatory work goes forward, not toward a deeper people in our own ways, but toward a different people in His holy ways, new creatures in Christ. It is in the darkest hours that light becomes most precious. With the gospel promises we might press forward undaunted, and stand as witnesses of the Lord in all places, and in all times, and against all odds. We might remember the promises as we survey the work before us:

*"...that which is of God is light, and he that receiveth light and continueth in God, receiveth more light, and that light groweth brighter and brighter, until the perfect day."*  
- Doctrine and Covenants 50:6b

Are you experiencing this light? Is it growing brighter and brighter in you? Can we say that we are troubled on every side, yet not distressed; that we are perplexed, but not in despair; Persecuted, but not forsaken; cast down, but not destroyed? Are we preparing, that is, being transformed in measures by the renewing of our minds until our way of thought is conditioned wholly by the kingdom of God and not the ways of man?

When tempted to despair, I remember the words given by inspiration through Brother Elbert A. Smith during a communion service in 1917:

*"Again, at this time, you are admonished that you be not unduly concerned because you are few in number as compared with the world. That is not your concern, but be concerned only that your righteousness shall be very great. For a few righteous men can accomplish very much, and a little levanted a great lump. 'I have many forces at work in the world', saith the Lord. 'I have many spiritual forces at work that you know not of. You see the smaller part of my work, and the world perceives it not at all.' Therefore be not concerned because you are few in number, but let each one look to himself, and to the condition of his own heart and life."* - Saints Herald, vol. 64
