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Reflections on the Pacific Northwest Summer Youth Camp 2017



A Special Evening of Music and Worship



Nepal and India Mission



Between August 26, 2017 and September 11, 2017, I was blessed to travel with Brothers Lyle Smith and Doug Smith on a mission to Nepal and India. Beginning in Kathmandu, we served at a Priesthood Retreat in the mountains near Tibet. Finding that we had access to power, we prepared Keynote presentations on our phones and, using Brother Lyle's small portable projector, we were able to share classes most of each day. By asking for help with translation we were able to get the transliterated forms of each slide. Then, using a free Nepali keyboard available on the iPad, we were able to use slides with Nepali script (see the examples below). Even when the building lost power, the Lord blessed us. On one such occasion, we continued with our classes using the projector after the building had lost power! Before leaving Kathmandu, we were able to visit with an older woman named Dahn, who had been illiterate from her youth. To this day, she is unable to read any text in her native tongue. However, several years ago, when presented with the Bible and Book of Mormon in Nepali, she took up the books and read them instantly from cover to cover. At present, she remains unable to read any text except for verses from the Bible and Book of Mormon, which she reads without the slightest difficulty. Brother Lyle stayed behind in southern Nepal, offering a much needed pastoral ministry, while Brother Doug and I traveled through the mountains of northeast India. We stayed in the homes of those given to hospitality and shared the gospel wherever given opportunity. Again and again I was reminded of the promises of God, that His work will not be frustrated:

The works, and the designs, and the purposes of God, cannot be frustrated, neither can they come to naught, for God doth not walk in crooked paths; Remember, remember, that it is not the work of God that is frustrated... (Doctrine and Covenants 2:1a, 2a)

When you feel like giving up, stand up and shake off the coals. Just when things seem most difficult and all seems lost, remember the cause. Keep your eyes upon the glory of God. Even now, God is moving in powerful ways. Don't give up!
