Fall Conference 2019

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The Saints of the Pacific Northwest gathered at regional activities throughout 2019 under the banner of the regional theme: "A City on a Hill". We were blessed in youth retreats, a women's retreat, a men's retreat, a summer preaching series, a Young Adult Group retreat, a reunion, a youth camp, a priesthood retreat, and the fall conference. Each of the gatherings were well attended and received our loving Father's Holy Spirit as old and young sought to be all that He has made us to be for His glory. The Northwest Region also enjoyed the ministry and fellowship of many visitors. The last formal gathering of 2019 was marked by worship and meetings at fall conference, where the Saints nominated and elected those who will serve the region in 2020.

Each organized branch within the region also elects a representative to serve on the regional missionary board. This board is comprised of three elected officers, one from each branch, who oversee the regional missionary fund. The fund has been used to assist in the printing of the Book of Mormon in Nepali, to send scriptures and Restoration books around the world, and send missionaries from the Pacific Northwest overseas to spread the gospel. In 2018, the fund helped five young families within the Church start small businesses in Kenya so that they could be self-sufficient (\$200 per family). The funds were also used to build a church for the congregation in Bumageni, Uganda. Several of the men from Salem, Oregon traveled to assist in constructing the church, which is the first permanent church building of the Restoration in Uganda. Monies from the regional missionary fund were also used to advance the church headquarters building in Kisumu, Kenya, where the Church will be able to hold retreats, camps, and worship services without ongoing rental fees.

By conference action, the Saints dedicated surplus monies from regional savings as follows: \$1,000 to the 2020 women's retreat, \$1,500 to the 2020 youth camp, and \$1,000 to the Light a Home Project administered by the African Restoration Ministries.

As one year ends, let us commit ourselves to serving the Lord in the next. We rejoice in the fruit that has come, and renew our minds to labor evermore, that the Lord might bring forth even more abundantly in the seasons before us!



Priesthood Retreat

Salem Branch Building Project Update

On July 1, 2016, a thorough cost analysis was prepared for the Salem Branch for the building of a new church. The analysis was broken down into two phases. The first phase would satisfy all local, county, and state requirements necessary to obtain an occupancy permit, whereby the Saints could begin worshipping in the church building while they saved for more refined finishes. The estimate to meet the requirements for occupancy was \$472,000, including surveying, site work, insurance, applications and permits, utility work, road improvements, a \$12,500 in contingency layaway, and the building. In the fall of 2016, the Salem Branch set an informal and non-binding goal of raising \$300,000 of the \$472,000 over the course of five years. The group intends to pay for as much of the project as they can in cash, committing themselves to a period of saving and fundraising so that their debt might be small and easily managed.

Over the past three years, the Saints have set aside more than \$210,000 in cash for the building project. The land has been purchased and paid for in full. Ahead of schedule, the branch leadership will begin investigating the most favorable financing options to close the gap as the congregation approaches their fundraising goal. The Lord has already opened many doors, rewarded the patience and delayed gratification of the Saints, and honored their discipline in savings. God has sent helpful municipal leaders, lawyers, and civil servants to prosper the work in His own timing, and we attribute every meaningful development to His gracious hand. May He be glorified as the project bears fruit in the coming years, and may the Saints be encouraged in their patient disposition, and dedicated service. Surely the day is growing nearer when the unseen labors of the faithful will yield fruit which is visible to all.

When additional information is available, it will be presented to the Salem congregation for prayerful consideration, including the potential financing options available as this project comes within our reach, and any projected increases in cost since the original cost analysis.



NW Contribution to Light a House Project

In August 2019, Saints from the Salem Restoration Branch began raising money for the "Light A House" Project, which supplies solar rechargeable LED lights/cell phone chargers to our Brothers and Sisters in Africa.

The Light a House Project is administered by African Restoration Ministries (ARM) based in Independence, Missouri. The lights are distributed to African families by our missionaries. In Salem, money is raised by collecting and returning bottles and cans, along with contributions by the Saints. Our contributions are sent to ARM in care of Brother Brian Mundy on a monthly basis. Plans are to continue to do this for as long as it is feasible.

To date, the Salem Restoration Branch has sent sufficient funds to acquire 60 LED lights/chargers. That's \$750. At the Annual Fall Conference of the Northwest Restoration Branches, Saints voted to contribute \$1,000, enough for 80 additional lights.





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An Elect Lady



Pray for the Missions

Brother Brian Herren and Brother Andrew Smith will be serving in Nepal and India during the early Spring of 2020. One of the ministries specifically requested is a priesthood retreat, which they plan to provide. Additional ministry will include missionary outreach where permissible and advisable, as well as sustaining ministry to Restoration Branches and scattered Saints. The hope is to promote the gospel of Jesus Christ through fundamental Restoration teachings as far as they are able. The primary focus will be on sharing Jesus Christ, and teaching what He has taught. Some points of emphasis will include the uniqueness of the Church of Jesus Christ, how it

has been restored to the earth, and how it is different than all other churches. Their sharing will address the principles of the doctrine of Christ, priesthood authority, the Book of Mormon, the Kingdom of God, the ordinances, the spiritual disciplines (prayer, study, etc.), and individual priesthood responsibilities.

Later in the year, a team of brethren from the Salem branch will serve in Uganda, Kenya, and Tanzania. At this point, the team plans to separate into two smaller groups once they arrive in Kenya. From Kenya, one team will travel to Tanzania to develop the missions field in that portion of the Lord's vineyard. The other team plans to travel to Bumageni, Uganda to contribute man power in construction projects and share the gospel in as many homes as is practical.

Even the best laid plans and most prepared servants depend entirely upon our Heavenly Father. Let's pray that His will be done, knowing His plans to be higher, and His provision to be perfect.

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
