One of the most cherished underpinnings of man's creation has been the divine principle of individual agency and the inseparable union between man's spirit and his freedom to choose. It was guaranteed by the Creator in the beginning, and every act of God since has both respected man's right to choose and directed him to choose well.

While personal agency is guaranteed by the Creator, and protected by immutable divine power, it is not in itself a guarantee of success. It is at once the potential to fulfill the measure of man's creation through intentional obedience, and at the same, an equal opportunity for complete and total self-destruction. God places no guardrails betwixt the two, making agency as dangerous as it is necessary:

"I call heaven and earth to record this day against you, that I have set before you life and death, blessing and cursing; therefore choose life, that both thou and thy seed may live...But if thine heart turn away, so that thou wilt not hear, but shalt be drawn away, and worship other gods, and serve them; I denounce unto you this day, that ye shall surely perish." - Deuteronomy 30

The freedom to choose is clearly not a freedom from consequence. While man has been issued the inalienable right to choose his course, he has been denied any say whatsoever in the consequence of that choice. He may choose obedience, and receive salvation; or he may choose sin and receive condemnation; but he may not arrange for himself any other relationship between his choice and his outcome. The freedom to choose is not a freedom from the consequence of that choice. Agency fits man the director of his destiny by guaranteeing his hand on the sails, but does nothing to change the inevitable end of the course he chooses.

To admit the freedom of man is not to admit that he is alone. In fact, God has not been neutral in the matter at all, but has spoken clearly through the ages, and reached so far as one can reach. In what defies the self-centeredness of sin, He willingly suffered the consequence of sin Himself so that man may try again, and choose a different course, with a different end. Having received the wages of sin, and having paid the price of our transgression, His gift is another opportunity to each. The debt was not forgiven, but paid in full. In "He Who Is", page 100, Brother Oakman wrote, "Our Lord Jesus Christ utterly and completely defeated sin, not by rejecting it, but by accepting all of its effects in His own body...". We are free to be different now, and God's commandments mark the course from death to life. Still, man is free to choose.

This year, our theme will remind us to choose God, His Son, His Church, His Gospel, His light, and His Kingdom. Not once, but many times, and many times each day. Man is tested at the point where God's will puts at jeopardy his own plans and securities. Peter failed the test when he admonished the Lord, "Be it far from thee, Lord", forbidding Jesus to die, and Christ showed His perfection in Gethsemane when he uttered, "not my will, by thine be done". Many will do the good they could while still preserving their own ways and securities. Who will do the good which puts those securities at risk? Many will say, "Lord, Lord…", but who will do His will? Everyday, we will choose our course. Choose God's Kingdom (not speaking of Zion) and serve the King. Each day. Every way. At each intersection of life, "which way is the Kingdom way"? This year: "Choosing the Kingdom".


