Keep the Faith - Kindle the Fire

When God's people were free from the bondage of Egypt, He commanded that they should build a tabernacle, which would, in time, give rise to a more permanent temple. It was to be a place for the dwelling of God on earth, and a place where man and God would come together. The Lord's instructions describing how the the tabernacle should be built were exacting, and exquisitely detailed. God's people were directed to build an altar upon which sacrifices would be made. Importantly, once fire was set upon the altar, the fire was to burn continually, and never go out. God commanded it so:

"And the fire upon the altar shall be burning in it; it shall not be put out... The fire shall ever be burning upon the altar; it shall never go out." - Leviticus 6:12-13

God reiterates the message three times in the sixth chapter of Leviticus, cementing indelibly in the minds of the people that the fire once given, must not be neglected. It was sacred because it served to unite God and man, and holy because it would come from His presence. Once sent forth by the Lord, the fire would be entrusted to man. It would become a sacred and holy stewardship in serving to maintain a closeness to God. The extraordinary act of God sending the fire at first is recorded in the ninth chapter of Leviticus:

"And Moses and Aaron went into the tabernacle of the congregation, and came out, and blessed the people; and the glory of the Lord appeared unto all the people. And there came a fire out from before the Lord, and consumed upon the altar the burnt offering and the fat; which when all the people saw, they shouted, and fell on their faces." - Leviticus 9:23-24

The fire burned continuously for forty years as the Israelites dwelt in the wilderness, but not without great effort on behalf of the people. Though the fire was divine, it required constant attention to ensure its perpetuity amongst men. God had given the flame, but it was man's responsibility to keep it. Men would have to identify the kind of wood that would burn best, and not only know about the wood, but pursue it, cut it to size, carry it, stack it, and feed the flame. It would require daily work. Even one day of negligence would take a toll. The fire might shrink, little by little, until the last flickering flame would ultimately extinguish. This particular bond between God and His people could be quenched through human negligence, distraction, or other mindedness. Men would shield the flame from fierce desert winds, protect it from sudden thunderstorms, and preserve it

from their enemies. It was precious.

Today, we don't have a tabernacle made of animal skins in the wilderness, but our very bodies are tabernacles of clay (Mosiah 1:97, Moroni 9:6). We don't have a temple built of gold and silver, but we are a temple of the Lord (I Corinthians 3:16, II Corinthians 6:16). We don't have an altar covered in bronze, but we have a living altar surpassing all precious metals (Hebrews 13:10). God has also blessed us with a fire deep inside, a fire of divine origin, ancient and eternal...It was put there by the Lord, but entrusted to our keeping, that it should never go out, a bond between us and Him. We keep it by faith.

Do the flames within us shrink? Do they flicker in the wind? Have we watched a once roaring fire gradually surrender? Or have we been feeding the flames each day, preserving the fire from our fiercest foes, and resolving within that this flame shall never go out? This year, and every year...We must keep the faith...We must kindle the fire.

The series opens Friday evening at 6:45 pm at the Vancouver Restoration Branch. The series will continue Saturday evening at 6:45 pm in Vancouver, and conclude Sunday morning near Salem, Oregon. Sunday services will be held at Willamette Mission Park, beginning at 10:30 am, with a potluck to follow: 10991 Wheatland Road NE Gervais, OR 97026. Your fellowship is deeply appreciated. All of the Saints, near and far, are encouraged to attend the series. The Lord is sure to bless us as we keep the faith and kindle the fire. This year, Elder Karl Anderson has been invited to preach the series. I wanted to provide some biographical information here so that we can get to know a little more about Brother Karl before he arrives in June:

Born in Independence, Missouri, in May of 1966, Karl Anderson came to a knowledge of the Gospel of Jesus Christ at a very early age. The great, great grandson of Apostle Joseph Luff, he was raised just one block from the RLDS

Auditorium, growing up on Maple Street and playing in the back yard and parking lots of the Stone Church. Living in the center place he often attended the summer campus preaching series where he was privileged to sit under the ministry of many men who occupied the higher quorums of the church. Being in a home where the priesthood frequently visited and the gospel was openly shared, he learned at his mother's knee, and was taught by Sunday School teachers in the Center Stake of Zion, and later in Blue Valley Stake.

Brother Karl confesses that, like Apostle Paul, when the gospel came to him, it came in convincing power. He was called to the priesthood and ordained a Priest in June of 1988. He served in that office faithfully for 6 years, ministering in the homes of the saints, teaching classes, and preaching the gospel, as widely as he could. He was invited to preach and minister around the country, and traveled widely to bring ministry to the isolated and the shut ins. Karl spent many years counseling the saints and giving his heart to the Lord's work, serving wherever and whenever asked.

In 1994, the Lord called again, asking Karl to occupy as an Elder in his church. Having had strong testimony of this call, Karl humbly accepted and was ordained to the Melchisedec priesthood. In this office he found the love of Jesus Christ to a much greater degree and has sought to magnify that calling and to point the saints to the one true shepherd of their souls, our Lord Jesus Christ. Today he serves on the pastorate of the Knob Noster Restoration Branch, continuing the work that Apostle Luff started there in 1888. He joyfully serves with the other love of his life, his wife Margie. Karl's lifelong ambition and true heart's desire has been to bring to the church the revelation of Jesus Christ, to the glory of Almighty God.
